Care center visits, Storytimes, Baby and Me, kindergarten assessments and more are ways that EPL makes a difference with the children in our communities.

Reading Challenge

The Summer Reading Challenge brought another year of record participation.

Over **1,800** kids read during the eight weeks of the challenge. Over **10,000** rewards were claimed -- that's a lot of ice cream Challenge fosters a love of reading by allowing kids to read what they want. It also helps fight summer learning loss.
